Call it what you like, sequestration, furloughs, or the official name, the Budget Control Act of 2011. It doesn't matter as long as you understand that this has caused tremendous negative effects to the Department of Defense and the US Army. Sequestration has forced some Army installations to cancel Retiree Appreciation Day (RAD) this year. That is **NOT** the case for Fort Campbell. We will hold our RAD this year, as we have in the past. The date for the event is 5 October 2013 at the Passenger Processing Center (PPC) on Campbell Army Airfield.

Some organizations are precluded from attending this year due to sequestration, but we want you to know that there will be people there that can answer any question you have regarding your retirement benefits. Additionally, we are teaming up with AAFES, holding the event the same weekend as AAFES "Still Serving" weekend. Held world-wide from 5-11 October, the Still Serving weekend salutes former Soldiers by offering unique specials and events. Flyers from AAFES will begin arriving in your mailboxes shortly, featuring coupons and specials sales.

As always, at registration you will be assisted by our very

own Fort Campbell Retiree Council so you will be able to put a face with the name of the council member from your area.

The opening ceremony will begin with the Fort Campbell High School JROTC posting the colors, after which we will Pledge Allegiance. COL David Dellinger, Garrison Commander of Fort Campbell, will be the Keynote Speaker providing insight about the close relationship between Fort Campbell and the Retiree community. COL Dellinger is truly a friend of the Retiree who always has this population in mind when developing solutions or making decisions.

Blanchfield Army Community Hospital will sponsor a health fair to provide preventive health, dietary, height/weight, blood pressure screenings and other valuable information related to your health. Pneumonia and Influenza vaccinations will be available for Retirees and Spouses, as well as Shingles vaccinations. The location for the fair will be Bay "C" at the PPC.

Brunch will be served in a Dining Facility (DFAC) from 1000-1300. Brunch will cost \$5.25. Please try to have exact change. You will be able to have breakfast, lunch, or a combination of both. We strongly recommend you eat at the DFAC so you can see just how far meals have

come in the Army from the days of the "chow hall".

Fort Campbell is scheduled to provide numerous static displays manned by Soldiers recently returned from a tour of combat duty. The displays will feature weapons and equipment used by Soldiers in Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom/New Dawn. We will also make identification tags (dog tags) for any Retiree that wants a set.

And if these are not enough reasons to attend, there will be a special tour of Fort Campbell including an opportunity to familiarize with current small arms weapons at the Engagement Skills Trainer where you will fire replica weapons at realistic target scenarios, all inside a building rather than on a range. This realistic training is a first-person simulation designed to refine and test Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) to assist with combat readiness. Soldiers regularly use this facility to train prior to going to a "live-fire" range for weapons qualification.

For those that would like the opportunity to purchase Retiree related items, AAFES will be selling a large selection of these goods on site. There will also be a smaller variety of items for Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps Retirees. Cash and checks will be accepted as payment.

Veterans Treatment Court Needs Volunteers



MENTORING OPPORTUNITIES

Christian County Kentucky is initiating a Veterans Treatment Court (VTC) to assist Veterans with substance abuse and/or mental health related offenses. Veterans Treatment Courts will be based on the highly successful Drug Courts in use across the nation. Veterans Treatment Court is a judicially supervised intensive outpatient treatment program. The program consists of regular court sessions, individual and group counseling, educational groups, case management, recovery support meetings, drug testing, and mentoring. Veterans Treatment Court is a problem-solving court that operates under a specialized model in which the judiciary, prosecution, defense bar, probation, law enforcement, mental health, social service, and treatment communities work together to help veteran offenders find restoration in recovery and become productive citizens. Christian County Veterans Treatment Court is asking for volunteers in the military veteran community to assist as mentors in this program. The idea is that a veteran mentor can easily relate to the offended based on similar life experiences from military service. Need to Update Personal Information?

If you need to make a change to your records, such as a name change due to divorce or remarriage or if your birth date on record is incorrect, you have a few options.

Any correspondence to Human Resources Command (HRC) should include the full name of the Retiree, social security number, mailing address, and telephone number along with the supporting documentation such as marriage license, divorce decree, or court order that relates to the request.

First, you may email Human Resources Command and request the change. Write an email, attach the scanned supporting documents and email to askhrc.army@us.army.mil. Bear in mind, however, that any personally identifiable information (PII) sent to this address cannot be secured. As with any email that is not encrypted, there is a possibility that the PII can be stolen.

You may also make a change to your records by writing a letter requesting

the change or submitting a Standard Form-180 by mailing it to HRC. SF 180 can be located on the internet by typing the name of the form into any web browser such as Internet Explorer or Mozilla Firefox.

The address to send a hard copy request is Commander, Human Resources Command, ATTN: AHRC-PDR-V, DEPT. 420, 1600 Spearhead Division Avenue, Fort Knox, KY 40122.

Remember to keep your mailing address updated with DFAS. You may change your address using MyPay, by calling the RSO at 270-798-5280/3310, or by contacting DFAS at 1-800-321-1080.

Preparing for the Inevitable

Although most people would rather not talk about it, the issue of what needs to be done upon a retiree's death is relevant and should be addressed in order to provide valuable assistance to the survivor. Many times each month, the Retirement Services Office receives calls from grieving survivors who have no idea what to do or where to turn. The Casualty Assistance Center (CAC) and the Retirement Services Office are available to provide support and assistance to the survivor.

In the event of a retiree death several actions must be taken as soon as possible. First, the survivor needs to contact the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) at 1-800-321-1080 and report the death. You will need the retiree's social security number and the date of death when you call. DFAS will then take steps to close out the pay

account to prevent overpayment. If the retiree was enrolled in the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) or Retired Serviceman's Family Protection Plan (RSFPP), DFAS will take additional steps to initiate pay accounts for eligible beneficiaries. DFAS will also send out paperwork that will need to be filled out and returned.

Next, call the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213, the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) at 1-800-538-9552, and Department of Veterans Affairs (if the retiree was receiving disability compensation) at 1-800-827-1000. Lastly, contact the Fort Campbell CAC at 270-798-4727/4729. Additionally, the Army Casualty Website at <https://www.hrc.army.mil/site/active/TAGD/CMAOC/cmaoc.htm>, provides valuable information.

The CAC is the primary proponent on

Fort Campbell for service-member deaths and are truly subject matter experts. They will provide valuable assistance such as paperwork for pay and benefits, as well as one-on-one, personal assistance to help survivors through this difficult time.

Some retirees handle all of the family finances, keeping this information to themselves. This creates a huge problem upon their death, as the survivor has no idea of what and where bank accounts, life insurance policies, or investments are located. It is a good idea to organize all of this information so that the survivor can easily access these accounts.

Survivors handle this situation differently. Many grieve deeply, having a hard time dealing with the death and the myriad things that have to take place. Prepare for this traumatic event in order to make it easier for the survivor in this most difficult time.

Major TRICARE Changes Take Effect Soon

As of October 1, 2013, TRICARE Prime will no longer be available to beneficiaries living in certain areas in the United States. Prime Service Areas (PSAs) are geographic areas where TRICARE Prime is offered. PSAs were created to ensure medical readiness of the active duty force by augmenting the capability and capacity of military hospitals and clinics. The affected PSAs are not close to existing military hospitals or clinics and have never augmented care around military hospitals or clinics or Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) locations. If you live in an area affected by the PSA changes, you will be notified by mail. Your letter will include information about your remaining TRICARE health care options as well as where to get more information. Your TRICARE Prime benefit will remain available through the end of September as long as your enrollment fees are paid, you do not disenroll early or lose eligibility. Be assured that elimination or reduction of any PSAs will not change the overall TRICARE benefit for Retirees or their families currently living in these locations.

Retirees and Dependents

Retirees and their family members enrolled in TRICARE Prime in the affected PSAs may be able to reenroll in TRICARE Prime at a military hospital or clinic or with a primary care manager in a remaining PSA. They must fill out a new TRICARE Prime Enrollment, Disenrollment, and Primary Care Manager (PCM) Change Form (DD Form 2876) and sign Section V waiving their drive-time standards. Beneficiaries should be aware that waiving drive-time standards may require them to drive long distances for primary and specialty care. Those who do not reenroll in TRICARE Prime can use TRICARE Standard, the basic entitlement by law, and TRICARE Extra, which are consistently rated highly in beneficiary surveys. TRICARE Standard and Extra is a convenient option that has no enrollment fees and offers the freedom to see any TRICARE-authorized provider for routine or specialty care. An assigned primary care manager (PCM) is not required, and cost shares for a wide range of preventive medical services have been eliminated. With TRICARE Extra, you choose hospitals and providers within the TRICARE net-

work, where available, and pay a lower cost share.

Beneficiaries Enrolled in the TRICARE Young Adult (TYA)-Prime Option

Young adults whose sponsors are active duty service members will not be affected. Other young adults with TYA Prime in the affected PSAs may be able to waive their drive-time standards and fill out a new TRICARE Young Adult Application (DD Form 2947) to reenroll in TYA Prime at a military hospital or clinic or with a primary care manager in a remaining PSA. Those who do not reenroll in TYA Prime can purchase coverage under TYA Standard, which is \$152 monthly, compared with \$176 for TYA Prime.

What areas are affected?

TRICARE Retiree Dental Program Payment Changes

Beginning January 1, 2014, the new TRICARE Retiree Dental Program (TRDP) includes a number of Government directed changes that enhance the program's benefits and ensure premiums are as affordable as possible. Changes include requiring Delta Dental to verify enrollment eligibility with the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) and the reduction of options available to pay premiums. There are two options for payment of TRDP premiums: The primary option is through a government-mandated allotment

from retirement pay. Once the allotment has been initiated and verified through DFAS, payments will begin with the October 1, 2013 billing cycle. If a Retiree is not receiving retirement pay or has reached the number of allowed allotments, an electronic funds transfer (EFT) must be set up to pay monthly premiums in order to maintain TRDP coverage. If neither of these two options is suitable, coverage under the TRDP will be lost. The ability to pay premiums by check or through an online bill pay system will end in Septem-

ber 2013, so it is imperative that Retirees initiate this allotment as soon as possible in order to avoid any disruption or loss of benefits. Additionally, coupon booklets are not among the options available for payment of monthly TRDP premiums under the new contract. As a result, TRDP will no longer print or issue coupon books as a method of payment of premiums. What Exactly is a Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) Increase?

Retirees like to think that they receive a raise every year (or hopefully every year, at least). While the retired pay does increase, it is not a raise in retired pay in the traditional sense. What we receive is a cost of living allowance (COLA) increase. US Code, Title 10, the laws that cover the United States military, allow for a COLA increase if a certain requirement is met. That requirement is this (in a nutshell) - Retired pay shall increase by the percent (adjusted to the nearest one-tenth of 1 percent) by which the price index for the base quarter of that year exceeds the base index of the previous year. Kind of stuffy, I

know, so here is what it really means. Each year Military Retired pay, Survivor Benefit Plan Annuities, VA Compensation and Pensions, and Social Security benefits are adjusted for the rate of inflation. This annual cost of living adjustment is determined by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for Wage Earners and Clerical Workers for the previous year. For example, last year Retirees received a 1.7% COLA increase. That meant the CPI increased (inflation) 1.7% from the last quarter of FY 2011 to the last quarter of FY 2012. The more inflation the economy sees, the higher the CPI increases over the previous year. Simple,

right? That's why the COLA increase several years ago was 5.6% when gas prices rose to over \$4 a gallon. But beware. You may have heard in the news that there are ideas afoot to save money by reducing Retiree benefits. This is one change that is being looked at. The idea is to change the way the CPI is measured from Wage Earners and Clerical Workers to a chained CPI. This change is said to be more accurate in representing inflation but will almost certainly mean a smaller COLA for Retirees every year. Don't like this idea? Tell your elected officials how you feel about this proposed change to your COLA increases.

Burial Benefits for Veterans

In 1862, President Lincoln signed into law legislation authorizing the establishment of national cemeteries "... for the soldiers who shall die in the service of the country." Fourteen cemeteries were established that year. These national cemeteries were the beginning of today's National Cemetery Administration. Today there are 133 national cemeteries where qualified Veterans, their spouse and certain dependents may be buried (providing space is available). Additionally, most state Veterans Affairs Departments manage cemeteries for burial of Veterans. Tennessee Veterans Affairs Department operates four cemeteries (Nashville, Memphis and two in Knoxville) and Kentucky operates four cemeteries (Hopkinsville, Radcliff, Wil-

liamstown and Greenup County) with a fifth planned for Leslie County. National Cemeteries are open for burial in Chattanooga and Mountain Home. Cemeteries in Nashville, Memphis and Knoxville are available for cremation internment only. In Kentucky, Veterans cemeteries in Camp Nelson, Lebanon and Mill Springs are open for burial.

VA and State benefits are similar, where opening and closing of the grave, perpetual care, a Government headstone or marker, Presidential Memorial Certificate and burial flag are provided. Burial benefits available for spouses and dependents buried in a national or state cemetery include burial with the Veteran, perpetual care, and the spouse or dependents name and date of birth and

death will be inscribed on the Veteran's headstone, at no cost to the family. Eligible spouses and dependents may be buried, even if they predecease the Veteran.

Burial benefits are available to Veterans discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable, as well as any service member who died while on active duty. Verification of eligibility is DD Form 214 or discharge form.

Clarksville Patient Centered Medical Home for Active Duty Dependents Only

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In the most recent Army Echoes, there was an article about Patient Centered Medical Homes (PCMH). That article has sparked numerous conversations and requests for information regarding what and where Retirees can receive health care in this area.

First, Retirees are only able to use Blanchfield Army Community Hospital (BACH). The Screaming Eagle Medical Home, located at Gateway Hospital in Clarksville, TN is closed to any beneficiary other than active duty dependents, even though the article suggests that these facilities are for Retirees, as well as active duty and eligible beneficiaries.

Donna Faulkner, Chief of the Managed Care Division at Blanchfield Army Community Hospital (BACH) advised, "Per Hospital Commander's Policy #35, Retirees and their family

members who were not grandfathered to BACH prior to June 2004 will receive their Primary Care in the Network. BACH, however, reserves the Right of First Refusal for specialty and ancillary services within the military treatment facility when capability and capacity can be met. As a Retiree/Title 10 beneficiary, we encourage you to continue to use the specialty and ancillary services offered at BACH on a space available basis; Specialty services include Radiology, Pharmacy, Laboratory, and Nutrition Care. Ancillary services include General Surgery, Cardiology, Ophthalmology among others. However, due to limited resources in primary care, we ask that you establish your PCM in the network so we may support our Active Duty population and their families." Specialty and ancillary services offered at BACH are adjusted often

based on provider strength and a number of other considerations. To find out the latest information, contact your TRICARE contractor. So what is the bottom line concerning health care at BACH for Retirees? If the Retiree did not retire prior to June 2004, or was not grandfathered to BACH at that time, the Retiree must receive their primary care through the TRICARE network, off post. There are specialty services at BACH (listed above) that Retirees are encouraged to use, as well. Furthermore, Retirees are invited to use the pharmacy on post to fill prescriptions from both on and off post physicians. Need a Copy of your DD Form 214?

We receive calls weekly from Retirees that cannot locate a copy of their DD Form 214, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty. As you know, DD Form 214 and DD Form 215 (the official amendment to DD Form 214) are the official documents from the Department of Defense that verify a number of questions about your active duty service: How long you served, awards you earned, schools you attended, combat tours, home of record, etc. This document is commonly used to verify service for Department of Veterans Affairs benefits and employment preferences, among other benefits. If you currently have a physical copy of DD Form 214, make additional copies of this document and locate them in several different places. Keep one in a gun safe, fire safe, or safety deposit box. Give a copy to family members you can trust. You can even have a copy entered into the official record at a County Courthouse (do not do this if records are considered public domain in your county). If you lose a copy, one can be located easily.

If you do not have a copy, there are several ways to get one. If you separated in October 2002 or later, you can complete Standard Form 180 (SF-180) and email the scanned document to askhrc.army@us.army.mil, or mail it to Commander, Human Resources Command, ATTN: AHRC-PDR-V, DEPT. 420, 1600 Spearhead Division Avenue, Fort Knox, KY 40122. If you separated prior to October 2002, go to the National Archives website at www.archives.gov and select "Veterans Service Records". On the left side of the page you will see "Request Military Service Records". This area allows you to request records one of two ways. By using the "eVetRecs" system, a veteran completes an online request, prints and signs the last page and faxes it to the National Archives (this is to verify the person requesting has the authority to do so). Veterans can also request records by completing Standard Form 180 (SF-180) and mailing it to the National Archives. If you cannot access SF-180, you can write a letter containing the complete name used while in service, service or social security number, branch of service, dates of service and date/place of birth. Records are kept in different locations so use the address on SF-180 that pertains to your service.
